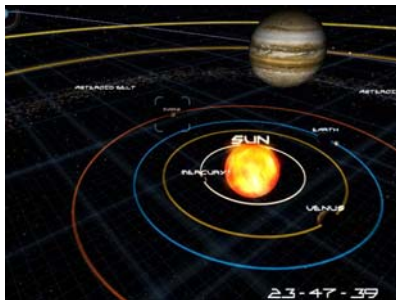

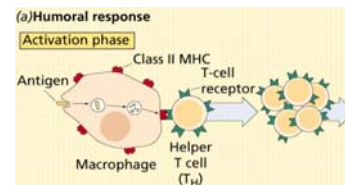

The Research Question

- A research study begins as a problem that a researcher would like to solve or as a question (or set of questions) that the researcher would like to answer
- The research question often evolves from a broad topic area
- In order to study a problem or question, the topic area needs to be narrowed

Sources of Research Problems

- Experience
- Nursing Literature
- Social Issues
- Theory
- Ideas from External Sources

For example.....

My research of family caregivers of people with Alzheimer's disease.....

The problem: Caregiver discomfort

The observation: Families continue to be distressed even as AD victim improves

The research question?

Then what?

Research the existing knowledge base regarding this topic area.....



Refining Your Question

What is that you really want to know?



For example...

Caregiver distress

Researcher defined versus Participant defined

Is distress the measure?

Are there are measures (e.g. depression, anxiety, physical problems)?

Is there a measure that has not been researched or has been thoroughly researched that you are interested in?

Frame the Clinical Question in the PICO format

Patient population
Intervention or interest
Comparison intervention or group
Otcome

In premature infants, is light versus music more effective in improving oxygen saturation

Which of the following is a well-defined nursing research question?

- Why do so many patients fall in the hospital?
- Do slippery floors cause falls in the hospital?
- In hospitalized rehab patients, does scheduled rounds versus room signage reduce falls?

Evaluating Research Questions

- Significance of the Problem
- Researchability of the Problem
- Feasibility
 - Time and Timing
 - Availability of Participants
 - Cooperation of Others
 - Facility / Equipment
 - Money
 - Experience of Researcher/s
 - Ethical Considerations

Communicating the Research Question

- Problem Statements
- Purpose
- Research Question
 - Hypotheses...what are they, when are they appropriate, how are they worded?
